Grow East Africa Mission:

To improve the quality of lives of rural African families and children through education by focusing on sustainable access to education, clean water, health service, rural agriculture and development





Executive Summary

<u>Grow East Africa</u> (GEA) is a USA based charity organization currently working in the rural Burji District of SNNPR Ethiopia. GEA's mission is to improve the quality of lives of the people of the Burji District of SNNPR Ethiopia by helping support access: to quality education in rural schools, clean drinking water for villagers, health services, rural agriculture, and development. We work in partnership with the local government, village elders, and other NGOs to improve our clients' livelihoods. We started our mission by implementing proven sustainable processes to impact poverty.

Over the last four years, GEA distributed 3-goats per family for 100 low-income families impacting the lives of over 600 people in the Bila Village. Most of these families' goats have multiplied to the extent some of the families have sold a few goats and purchased cows that have also given birth to calves.

In partnership with <u>Seeding Programs International</u>, GEA organized, registered, and trained fifty refugee ladies who were heads of their household (the Birhan Ladies Cooperative) to farm nutritional vegetables, quinoa and Teff for self-sufficiency. The ladies were trained in the utilization of modern drip irrigation to farm vegetables year-round and develop markets for their products. The ladies were also trained in developing individual entrepreneurial skills for livelihood improvement. This farm project has impacted the lives of over 300 people and exposed the community to a higher nutritional source for food. GEA is working with other interested local groups to duplicate the vegetable and quinoa growing initiatives to their villages.

In 2019, GEA and <u>Water Charity</u> partnered to deliver borehole water up a steep hill to the HareWenji village center. This project enabled school-age girls to spend their time doing school work, and the house hold wives to spend their time on productive chores, instead of two to three hours typically spent fetching water from the distant well. As a result of this project old and sick people now have access to clean water. This is a major improvement impacting over 4000 people.

Burji District with a population of 155,000 has only two high schools. At present, high school seniors graduate without having exposure to modern teaching materials such as computers. In 2019, GEA built a computer lab for the HareWenji high school. This lab is equipped with 25 desktop computers, chairs, and tables. Teachers were trained in IT applications. In addition, GEA installed a WiFi and an additional 25-desktop computers at the Soyama Youth Center for after school learning.



Goat Project

Since July 2016, GEA distributed goats to 100 in need families in Bila Village, improving livelihoods for over 600 people. Today, most of these families have multiple goats, and some have sold a couple of their goats and purchased cows.

Goats are sturdy and multiply fast, increasing the wealth of family, and provide nutrition

for children. Some of our clients who have more than six goats sold a couple of their goats and purchased young cows. Compared to a she-goat, a cow gives more milk, and farmers plow the field using oxen. Both cow and oxen are in high demand and are a symbol of survival and growth.

GEA is also supporting Mrs. Ayelech Anno, 2016 goat-recipient to develop and scale-up her special goat feed. At present, GEA purchases her feed and distributes to other

goat recipients. In addition, GEA is training a few of the recipients to form a small group

that will raise goats for the market as an alternative means of self-sufficiency.

In 2021 GEA will expand goat distribution to other villages.

Vegetables, Quinoa and Teff Farm

This project sponsors fifty households' females consisting of refugee and local poor families to become self-sufficient. In 2016 when GEA met these ladies, they had nothing

to survive on. In the following year, GEA partnered with <u>Seeding Programs</u> <u>International</u> and organized the ladies into a registered cooperative that produces nutritious vegetables, quinoa, and teff for food and to sell the excess in the local market.

GEA /SPI also partnered with the Burji District Management and Cooperative Office to train the ladies. The goal is to help the Birhan ladies develop a sustainable farming, market development, and bookkeeping skills for their produce. We also train the Ladies in sanitation, and hygiene.

During a long period between planting to harvest time, our ladies have no source of income to feed their families. To address this dire need, GEA initiated an alternative money-generating opportunity such as cereal trading was started.

GEA has plans to partner with international NGOs, such as the <u>Convoy of Hope</u> to train the ladies in market development and entrepreneur opportunities.

Access to Clean Water

In Burji District, less than 10% of homes have access to clean water. Children and

pregnant women suffer from waterborne diseases. Typically, school-age girls and women spend 2 to 3 hours daily fetching drinking water. School-age girls often are late to get to school and do not have time to do their schoolwork at home.

In 2019, GEA and Water Charity partnered to install a solar energy powered submersible pump to deliver borehole water from over a kilometer distance up a steep hill to the center of HareWanji village. As a result, school-age girls and women spend only a few minutes to fetch water, leaving them more time for productive chores. GEA has plans to partner with other NGOs and expand access to clean water to other villages.

Improving access to education

Burji District has only two high schools. None of the schools have essential learning

materials facilities such as computers, libraries, and science laboratories.

The student from Burji District that enters university spends their firstyear learning how



to use computers. None of the schools have a library nor a science laboratory. To

correct this educational deficiency, GEA built a computer lab for the HareWenji grades 11 and 12. We installed 25 desktops, chairs, and tables. Total of five hundred students from the morning and afternoon class sessions have access to the computer lab. We plan to extend computer usage into the other high school and mid dle schools. We are also planning to build and furnish science labs and libraries.

As the saying goes, the mind is a terrible thing to waste.

Combating COVID19 Spread in Rural Burji District

GEA is a partnership with the Burji Development Agency (BDA) trained 52 ladies representing 26 villages how to sew reusable face masks for protection against COVI19



The 52 ladies were divided into five smaller teams to perfect their sewing skills.

The newly trained ladies returned to their villages and trained their community on how to sew reusable face masks using hand stitching. This project has potential to reduce negative impact of COVI19 exposure on the lives of tenth of thousand residents.

Moving Forward

1. Burji District - Grow East Africa (GEA) VEGETABLE / QUINOA FARM

We want to increases the Birhan Ladies farming skills:

- Expanding Vegetables and Quinoa farming to other communities
- Train other local farmers to grow Quinoa
- Increase farm size with contracts and leasing processes
- Train Birhan Ladies in farm resource management

2021 will bring a new expansion of our current pilot program by the purchase of a tractor. This tractor will allow us to greatly increase our impact not only on our focus of quinoa but the entire farming community that must wait sometimes for months to schedule the other two tractors. With this modern approach to farming, we know that our impact will be able to expand to neighboring villages.

2. GOAT Project

GEA will expand the goat project to Gotche village. We will also continue to support Bila Goat project growth by scaling up Mrs. Ayelech Anno goat- feed recipe that will be distributed to each goat recipients. GEA will also infuse seed-funds for goat fattening and marketing initiative as an expansion to self-sufficiency.

3. WATER Project

GEA will collaborate with Burji District water department and international NGOs to bring clean water to three villages that have no drinking water.

4. TEACHING MATERIALS

GEA will collaborate with the Burji District education departments and international NGOs to introduce quality education materials such as computers and computer labs, science books, laboratories and libraries.
